The Scope of These Guidance Leaflets

The title of this series of leaflets has been inspired by the 1960s (but even more relevant today) iconic book, *Small is Beautiful: Economics as if People Mattered*, by E.F.Schumacher.

This leaflet is one of a series which give a quick overview of the various things that you will need to consider in managing the money of a small charity.

They are NOT a full and comprehensive guide to Charity Law and all the associated regulations. They are just an overview, in simple everyday language (rather than legalistic/accountancy jargon) of the main points for those who want to run their small charity efficiently and effectively for the benefit of their local community, or to help trustees who have encountered a common difficulty.

So, if you are expecting your charity's annual income to be more than £150,000/yr, or to own property, or to employ more than the equivalent of 3 full-time staff then you will probably need to seek professional guidance elsewhere.

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Internal Financial Controls

Self-Assessment Checklist

This leaflet has been adapted from the Charity Commission's Financial Controls Self-Assessment Checklist (Crown copyright acknowledged) which can be found and downloaded on-line at:

On that website there is also a separate document giving more details on the various items in the checklist. But it is 30 pages long and, like so much official guidance for charities, written on a "one size fits all" approach to official guidance from the Commission – the "size" being "fitted" being the needs of the small (20%) minority of large charities which have teams of office staff to carry out their financial functions, leaving the majority of small charities (the 80% with incomes of less than £100K) to cope with guidelines which are largely inappropriate to their needs.



Although in places the checklist is a bit nit-picky-pedantic (for small charities), going through it doesn't take very long. And even if many of the answers are 'Not Applicable' it can be useful to have a formal record that the issue had been given consideration (rather than a 'No' answer because it had been overlooked) and might draw attention to some things which were relevant to the charity and had been overlooked.

Not all the controls listed will be appropriate for all charities, for example, where a section of the checklist deals with an area of activity that the charity does not undertake then that section of the checklist will not apply.

Charities must always comply with legal requirements and those requirements are identified in the checklist.

For obvious reasons the "No" option has been blocked, leaving only "Yes" or "Not Applicable".

A 'Yes' answer for good practice recommendations does not mean there is no scope for further improvement.

A 'No' answer does not always indicate a problem. It may be that the charity has not put in place a particular control because the risk involved is small and the potential loss is acceptable, given the cost that would be involved in putting in place stronger internal controls.

This leaflet includes an additional column (not present in the Charity Commission's on-line checklist) for a 'X' answer to indicate that the control is not applicable. Even if many of the answers are 'Not Applicable' it can be useful to have a formal record that the issue had been given consideration (rather than a 'No' answer because it had been overlooked) and might draw attention to some things which were relevant to the charity and had been overlooked.

Finally, the answers in the checklist should be based on the trustees' knowledge of what actually happens in the charity and not what they expect to happen.

**Having an internal control in place is only part of the picture.
It must operate in practice to be effective.**

a) Has the charity kept the necessary records to identify transactions with 'substantial donors' for donations received up to April 2011? <i>{legal requirement}</i>			
b) From April 2011, have the trustees put in place procedures to identify 'tainted charity donations'?			
2.6. Trading income			
a) If the charity undertakes trading activities (either trading in furtherance of its objects or non-charitable trading):			
i if the level of non-charitable trading is significant is it carried out in a trading subsidiary?			
ii does the charity have a pricing policy for the goods and services supplied?			
iii does the charity have invoicing procedures for goods and services supplied?			
iv does the charity review outstanding debts and collection procedures?

a) Is there a written policy on the authorisation of expenditure?			
b) Are invoices received checked against orders confirming pricing and the receipt of the goods or services ordered?			
3.2. Controls and authorisation of expenditure on grants			
a) If the charity makes grants, does it have a grant-making policy?			
b) Does the charity make and monitor grants in accordance with the grant-making policy?			
3.3. Payment by cheque			
a) Does the charity follow any stipulation in the governing document about who can sign cheques?			
b) Does the bank mandate require at least two signatories?			
c) Is there a practice of not signing of blank cheques?			
d) Are cheque books etc kept in a secure place with access only by nominated persons?			
e) Are any monetary limits placed on an individual's signing recorded in writing?			
f) Is all cheque expenditure recorded in the cash book and noted with the relevant cheque number, nature of payment and payee?			
g) Are cheques signed only with documentary evidence of the nature of the payment, eg invoice?			
3.4. Payments by debit/credit/charge card			
a) Does the charity have a policy for the use of payment cards, including the criteria for their issue, spending limits and security?			
b) Does the charity communicate the policy for the use of cards to all trustees and staff using them?			
c) Are cards cancelled when the holder ceases to work for the charity?			
d) Is all card expenditure supported by vouchers and invoices and recorded in the accounting records each time the card is used?			
e) Are card statements sent to the charity finance team and checked to supporting records and invoices?			
f) Is the cardholder's use of the card independently reviewed periodically to confirm its use is consistent with the policy?

3.5. Payments by direct debits, standing orders and BACS direct credit			
a) Are only named individuals authorised to set up direct debits, standing orders and direct credits?			
b) Does the charity use a dual authorisation system for BACS payments?			
c) Does the charity monitor the arrangements to ensure that automatic payment arrangements are cancelled when the goods and services are no longer being supplied to the charity?			
3.6. Payment in cash			
a) Is every effort made to minimise cash payments?			
b) Are all payments by cash made from a cash float and not from incoming cash?			
c) Is supporting documentation authorised by someone other than the person maintaining the petty cash or the person making the claim?			
d) Are details of all payments entered in a petty cash book?			
e) Are regular independent checks made of the petty cash float and records?			
3.7. Wages and salaries			
a) Are statutory deductions (tax and NIC) made from employees' wages and salaries and regularly forwarded to HMRC? <i>{legal requirement}</i>			
b) Does the charity comply with minimum wage legislation? <i>{legal requirement}</i>			
c) Are any other deductions from salaries made only where they are required or authorised? <i>{legal requirement}</i>			
d) Are the end-of-year returns (P60 and P11Ds) completed and filed with HMRC by the deadline? <i>{legal requirement}</i>			
e) If the charity employs staff are the required pension arrangements in place? <i>{legal requirement}</i>			
f) Do all employees have contracts of employment?			
g) Are personnel records kept and held separately from wages records?			
h) Are salary levels properly authorised and recorded?			
i) Is there a system of authorisation for recording and notifying starters and leavers, changes of hours and other payroll changes?			
j) Are payments made by BACS?			
3.8. The payment of expenses and reimbursements			
a) Does the charity have a written policy to cover the payment and reimbursement of expenses?			
b) Is the policy communicated to all trustees, staff and volunteers?			
c) Are expenses reimbursed only where the individual incurred the expense in the course of carrying out the charity's business?			
d) Does the expense claim include a self-declaration that the claim is accurate and incurred on the business of the charity?			
e) Are reimbursements made by BACS transfer or cheque?			
f) If the charity pays mileage rates for travel are the rates in accordance with HMRC approved rates?			
3.9. Loans			
a) Are the terms of the loan documented?			
b) Does the charity have a repayment plan in place to repay the principal and any interest due?

3.10. Checks on expenditure records			
a) Are regular checks made to ensure expenditure records are accurate and agree with the bank statements?			
b) Are regular checks made to ensure no discrepancies between the payments made and the original invoice or payment records?			
c) Are checks made by someone other than the person who made the entry in the accounting records?			
4. Assets and investments			
4.1. Controls over fixed assets			
a) Is a comprehensive fixed asset list held and updated regularly?			
b) Are assets checked regularly to ensure they are still in good repair and are of use to the charity?			
c) Has insurance cover been considered?			
d) Is the use of fixed assets reviewed annually (to ensure put to best use and serving the charity's interests)?			
4.2. Investments			
a) Does the charity have an investment policy?			
b) Does this policy include the need to consider diversification of investments, including bank accounts?			
c) Is the performance of investments regularly reviewed?			
d) Is professional advice taken, where appropriate, on the selection or disposal of investments?			
e) Does the charity inspect investment properties to ensure tenant covenants are adhered to?			
f) Are there controls to ensure that all investment income due is received?			
4.3. Money held as a current asset			
a) Are secure records held of all bank and building society accounts?			
b) Are bank statements regularly received and regular bank reconciliations carried out?			
c) Are instructions to open or close accounts properly authorised and reported to trustees?			
d) Are checks made to ensure that there are no dormant accounts?			
e) Are the accounts monitored to ensure there is no third party use?			
f) Do the trustees regularly review the costs, benefits and risks of their current and deposit accounts?			
4.4. Electronic banking			
a) If the charity uses electronic banking to make payments does the system used require authorisation of transactions by two individuals?			
b) Are PCs kept secure with up-to-date anti-virus and spyware software and a personal firewall?			
c) Are trustees and staff made aware of the need to ensure that the charity's security details (including the password and PIN) are not compromised?			
d) Is the PIN and password regularly changed, for example to mitigate the risks of compromising security when individuals leave the charity?			
e) Does the charity maintain a list of persons (trustees and staff) who are approved to have access to the PIN and password?			
f) Does the charity keep an audit trail of electronic banking transactions?			
g) Have those using online banking facilities been trained in their use?

4.5. Non-traditional banking				
a)	If the charity uses non-traditional banking methods:			
	i are policies set and approved by trustees defining the circumstances when non-traditional banking methods may be used?
